#### **WORK SCHEDULE**



Labo Intern's spend much of their time working with Japanese youth, helping out with international exchange programs, or assisting staff at the office. It is a great position for **outgoing**, **active individuals** looking to meet a lot of new faces!

Labo Interns work eight hours a day, five days a week, with compensatory time off awarded for any work during weekends or evenings. In addition to all regular holidays, Interns have a total of ten days of vacation.

# **HOMESTAY**

Labo Interns live with the families of office staff, Labo Party members, or their leading Tutors. Each homestay typically lasts one to two months. The lifestyles and interests of your hosts may vary, but each family has a desire to welcome a young adult from abroad into their homes—to learn as their share languages, cultures and ideas.

Consistently using Japanese in their everyday life and experiencing the livelihoods of Japanese people first-hand, Labo Interns deepen their understanding of modern Japan. Host siblings and parents are instrumental in teaching Japanese etiquette and the proper language to use in context. In many cases, people in the household will not speak any English, so Labo Interns are encouraged to improve their language skills!





# **INTERNS RECEIVE:**

- · A Japanese Cultural Studies Visa
- · Airfare to and from Japan
- · Language lessons and training
- A monthly stipend of 50,000 yen (currently about 450 USD)
- Room and board with host families (excluding lunch on weekdays)
- Travel expenses for all workrelated travel in Japan, including commuting costs, lodging, and meals during Labo programs
- Reimbursement for research expenses up to 40,000 yen
- · Basic health insurance coverage

# **CULTURAL STUDY PROJECT**

While in Japan, Labo Interns are required to research a selected topic of traditional Japanese culture. Labo will assign Interns eight hours (one working day) per week for this research and assist with making necessary arrangements. Labo can also offer limited financial support for expenses related to the Cultural Study Project.

Ideas for projects include Tea Ceremony, Lacquerware, Ainu Fabric, Shamisen, and more! Projects that focus on aspects of Japanese society have also been possible, with approval.
